



Moment for Mission Be Reconciled: Move Together, Heal Together, Bound Together

How many of us know someone who has gone to their grave with a grudge or lived a significant portion of their lives estranged from loved ones? The impact of the resolve to never give in and to make others wrong in order to be right can live on for generations. Recently, one of our Disciples Care ministries hosted a night of conversation about the history of racial discord in Omaha, Nebraska. The catalyst for the conversation was the publishing of the book The Rhythm Boys of Central High at the '68 Racial Divide. Summarily, the book describes the events surrounding the school's first all-African American basketball team in 1968.

The events of the upheaval that occurred just before the team was to play in the state championship are still felt and seen in

Omaha today. In the grant report to Reconciliation Ministry, the event organizers said, "The expressions on the faces of the students from all of the area high schools revealed surprise and disbelief as they listened. This event opened the door for conversation to continue with sensitivity and deeper understanding of the community where we live and serve."

In our thematic scripture Jesus says: "So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift." (Matthew 5:23-24, NRSV) The assumption in the text is that Reconciliation is an urgent disposition. The scripture says, before you do anything in worship, before you worship Me with your gifts, be Reconciled. God created us to live harmonious lives with each other.

Current events with police-community relations, worshipers being killed in Bible Study, churches burning and churches providing safe haven offer abundant opportunity to move together and heal together as the body of Christ. Through your generous giving, doors are opening! When you give to Reconciliation Ministry, you are supporting the development of young leaders, promoting conversation models for congregations and community groups and enabling Regional granting programs that enliven our camps and congregational ministry. Your giving ultimately restores the beloved community that is "inextricably bound together in a network of mutuality," empowering all of God's family to be fully whole.

Jose, Maribel and the Angel Dewayne

Let me tell you a story, or two, or three. A year ago, as my brother and I prepared to walk the Camino de Santiago, we met a young woman at the Paris gate in O'Hare airport. She was carrying a back pack, sleeping mat and walking stick. We took a chance and asked about her equipment and found she was going to the Camino, as well. Maribel, a 22-year-old bilingual medical student from Ciudad de Juarez, Mexico. Through a series of unfortunate incidents transformed into blessing, she became our traveling companion. When I was forced to come home, she walked on with my brother.

Maribel was a gift to us from the beginning of our journey. We were traveling across Spain, and who doesn't need a bilingual medical student on a 500-mile hike. But, she was more---her gracious kindness, her hospitality, her sense of humor, her courage, her willingness to embark on a life-changing pilgrimage endeared her to us in ways we could not have imagined. Knowing Maribel changed us.

And, then, I met Jose, the only taxi driver outside the O'Hare Hilton one particularly stormy night when my flight home was cancelled. Through a series of unfortunate incidents transformed into a blessing, Jose gave me a "fare" deal and drove me home to Bloomington. As we traveled he talked about his grandmother from Monterrey who was a school teacher in Chicago. He talked about his mother raising six children. She lives near Mexico City. He talked about his wife and family; three children---two girls and a boy. I saw pictures as we drove. We talked about faith. He is Catholic.

His wife belongs to a church that criticizes other churches (including his) because they know the "right" way. We talked about how that's not helpful to bringing people together. We shared stories of Our Lady of Guadalupe. He had been part of a team that carried the light from the Our Lady of Guadalupe cathedral in Mexico City to Acapulco on the coast. I told him about meeting Our Lady in El Salvador. First in a dream, then as a witness to the suffering of her people. He told me his grandmother had given him a statue of Our Lady, but his wife had thrown her away. I apologized for the hurt---the church has caused in its righteousness. He told me the second largest feast of Our Lady takes place Dec. 12 in the Chicago suburbs. We parted in gratitude---both blessed by our encounter.

And, then, I met Dewayne at the old office building parking lot sale. It seemed like an unfortunate incident, (only a handful of people) but then it was transformed into a blessing. Dewayne is a flea market wheeler dealer who knows how to get things done. He sent out messages and brought in help – a couple homeless young men from the Salvation Army and a local junk dealer. Within several days he paid me (CCIW) to clear out our building! Oh, and Dewayne has a tattoo of a little devil sitting on a heavenly cloud---that's the way his grand-daughter, a former St. Jude's leukemia patient sees him.

For all the strangers/pilgrims who offer grace and companionship; who carry the light to help us a long our way; who make things happen--- I have nothing but gratitude: Maribel, Jose and the angel Dewayne.



New Day—for Spiritual Transformation

We are being invited to a deeper relationship with God. God is ready and we're working on our part.

Through the Regional church, we are offering a new partnership in spiritual transformation – for individuals and congregations. We have had three **New Day** retreats with very good reviews. The retreats brought an invitational approach, creating a space to draw near to God and one another. We had a wonderful leadership team in Teresa Dulyea-Parker, Al Keeney, Dick Hamm, Kris Tenny-Brittian and Scott Woolridge.

The retreats focused on deepening relationships through worship, prayer and other spiritual practices. Conversations were offered to share our part of our spiritual autobiography and talk about our own uniqueness as God's creation. We discussed what it means to be transformed, as individuals and as congregations. We were led in an exploration of our identity, our context and our Godly calling. Free time was offered to Sabbath, prayer and exploration.

One experience that enriched the retreats was an offering of Parker Palmer's Circles of Trust, a process of spiritual discernment. Offering good listening skills and asking open-ended questions are important in this endeavor.

All along the way, we've talked about the journey of individual transformation having an impact on congregational transformation. What we learn about how our own change/our own calling can inform the work we do as a family of faith.

There were some congregations who encouraged several of their members to attend the retreats. We are especially hopeful this "critical mass" will have a strong, positive influence on the life of the congregation. We will offer gatherings/reunions to help sustain the transformation that has begun. Lives are being changed. New commitments to spiritual practices lead to new energy and more faithful ministry.
