REGIONAL MINISTER'S MOMENT

Forward Together—Faithful Witness,

One of the wonders of Regional Ministry is being able to witness the life and faith of the church in all of its manifestations. Week by week, my Associate, Scott Woolridge, and I travel around our region to different worship settings. We meet with search committees, vision teams, boards. We go to congregational gatherings and hear the stories of the church at work. Stories of faithful witness abound, as do the concerns for the "future" of our church.

Regional ministry also includes a host of committees and task groups. One is the Ministry Committee. The task of this committee is to encourage candidates for ministry and to uphold "fitness" for ministry. We have the opportunity to meet seminary students and commissioned ministry candidates. It is refreshing to hear the stories of God's call and to witness development of leaders into that calling. There is hope in the voices we hear.

We also know we need to raise up ministers for non-traditional/bi-vocational calling/part time positions. And, the cost of education makes it almost impossible to serve part time. This is another opportunity for you to be in prayer.

As your Regional Minister, I also witness the work of the wider church. Recently, at our Disciple Divinity House/UChicago Trustees meeting I had the chance to listen to the work of the House/School in partnership with a German Theological School in Heidelberg. The students were sharing their observations. A young German theological student said that conversation about race is different in his country. There is an awareness of a traumatic genocidal history, and a deep humility based on that awareness. He told us that it was even a difficult decision to wave the German flag when the German team won the World Cup. (Imagine that.)

As I listened to his perspective, I couldn't help but wonder in our climate of nationalism, if we have forgotten the simple humility of being followers of Jesus? As Disciples of Christ, a movement for wholeness is a fragmented world, where all are welcomed at the Table as we have been welcomed, I believe that is a particularly poignant question for us to consider. It may indeed be the question of our time. And, yet again, another opportunity for prayer.

Women's Spring Gathering Freedom: Promise and Struggle

With the holidays behind us, it is time to look ahead to what 2017 offers us.

All women of the church are invited to attend the Spring Gathering at the Chiara Center, 4849 La Verna Road Springfield, II on Saturday, March 25, 2017 from 10 AM - 3 PM. The theme of the day will be **Freedom: Promise and Struggle**, with the focus being on prayer and prayer disciplines. The Rev. Dr. Marti Steussy will be speaking on the Psalms and those attending will have opportunities to explore a variety of prayer disciplines in the afternoon. The day will provide an opportunity to connect with God and other women of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Illinois and Wisconsin as we worship, learn and fellowship together. Information will be provided about new Disciples Women resources, learning and mission opportunities.

Our Keynote speaker will be Reverend Dr. Marti J. Steussy is the Professor of Bibical Interpretation emerita at Christian Theological Seminary. She is a Biblical Storyteller who brings extensive knowledge of the Bible, Dr. Steussy has published or edited numerous works including Samuel and His God (U of South Carolina Press, 2010), David: Biblical Portraits of Power (USC 1999), Psalms (Chalice Commentary for Today series, 2004), The Chalice Introduction to the Old Testament (2003), Gardens in Babylon: Narrative and Faith in the Greek Legends of Daniel (Scholars Press 1993), and two science fiction novels. Forest of the Night and Dreams of Dawn (Del Rev 1987 and 1988). She was a translator for the Common English Bible project (Eerdmans, 2011), has written and edited notes for CEB study Bibles, and written and published numerous essays and articles. Since her retirement in 2014, Dr. Steussy has continued to teach at the seminary part time. Her teaching portfolio includes classes on forgiveness. She has also hiked the Camino de Santiago de Compostela in Spain and parts of the Kumano Kodo (a Japanese pilgrimage trail), completed a two-year certificate in Self Psychology with the Center for Religion and Psychotherapy of Chicago, and memorized the Sermon on the Mount in Greek. She and her husband Nic (a biochemist at Purdue University) have two adult children and a cat.

Program



Dear CCIW Community:

I am writing to you because of an opportunity for spiritual deepening that is available this coming Lent. As many of you know, I am involved in the work of the Shalem Institute for Spiritual Formation (shalem.org) in Washington, DC. For over 40 years, Shalem has been guiding people on their spiritual journeys with programs that open their minds and awaken their hearts. I am delighted to be partnering with Shalem Institute for Spiritual Formation to offer a six-week course, beginning in March, with inperson and online components. Recognizing and living into one's call is a lifelong process of discernment. Our time together will invite you to look at your life, no matter what age, and notice your unique contribution to God's vision.

The course will run for six weekly sessions. The course will run from Sunday, March 5 through Sunday, April 9, 2017. You will also be able to access the online material for two weeks after the course ends.

Each week, you will receive a Sunday email with a link to new course material online. You will be able to listen to the audio stories and guided meditations as many times as you wish throughout the week from your home computer. There will also be opportunities for journaling personally and optional shared journaling online with the larger eCourse community. On Thursdays, you will receive an email to check in around the course material from that week.

All online material is designed to support your daily practice, which is the most important component of the course. There is no homework, mandatory lessons, readings, or writing. Below is an overview of the topics covered each week:

Week 1: What is Mine to Do?

Week 2: Calling to Embody Love

Week 3: Natural World Week 4: Role Models

Week 5: Challenges and Underlying Gifts

Week 6: Review and Reflection

Each week includes an audio recording sharing stories of discernment, a guided meditation, and an engaging reflective exercise with journaling questions.

As well as the online course, we will have an opportunity to have a more personal connection with each other. Depending on how many of us from CCIW there are I will set up an online or location gathering so that we might share together what has been happening as we have gone through this program.

With this partnership with Shalem, I am able to offer you this six-session online and in-person experience for \$50, if we have a group of 10 or more. If we have less than 10, but more than 3 that cost will be \$68. The regular cost of the program is \$75.






